Learning to Think Spatially National Research Council 2005-02-03 Spatial thinking "a constructive combination of concepts of space, tools of representation, and processes of reasoning" uses space to structure problems, find answers, and express solutions. It is powerful and pervasive in science, the workplace, and everyday life.
